
Agriculture Fact Sheet Cotton 2015



- Mississippi ranks #3 in the United States in cotton and cottonseed production.
- In 2015, Mississippi had 824 cotton farms growing 670,000 bales.
- The value of cotton production in 2015 was \$254 million.
- Cotton is usually planted between April 28 and May 28 and is harvested between September 15 and November 17.
- No one knows the exact origin of cotton. Scientists searching caves in Mexico found bits of cotton bolls and pieces of cotton cloth that proved to be at least 7,000 years old.

- Cotton keeps the body cool in summer and warm in winter because it is a good conductor of heat.
- One bale of cotton weighs about 500 lbs., the weight of a fully grown grizzly bear.
- Cotton is produced on about 18,155 farms in the United States.
- As America moved toward the 20th century, cotton played a key role in the creation of many new products. Examples include:
 - Thomas Edison discovered that charred cotton made the ideal filament for the world's first electric light.
 - The Wright Brothers used cotton muslin to cover the wings of their first plane.
 - Cotton provided the magic cord for tires that helped put America on wheels.
- Cotton has hundreds of uses from blue jeans to shoe strings. Clothing and household items are the largest uses, but industrial products account for many thousands of bales.
- Cotton is used in:
 - Cotton Cloth
 - Cellulose (For making plastics, explosives, batting, etc.)
 - Livestock Feed
 - Margarines and salad dressings
 - Enrichment of the soil
